PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



Dear Friend,

It's hard to believe, but we've just reached the end of our second full year of operation already. Of having a core group of volunteers band together to advocate for women diagnosed with mucinous ovarian cancer. And, equally important, to raise money to fund vital research on this disease.

As I write this, the third edition of the *Power of Hope*, I do so with a grateful, but heavy heart. I am excited about the progress we've made already, but saddened that results didn't come in time to benefit my sister, Rhonda.

Leading the Way With Research

Looking forward, as she would want us to do, research remains our top priority. And the quality of proposals we've received for consideration for *Rhonda's Award 2024* is amazing! Just wait until you learn more about the winner when it's announced in September. We are also thrilled with the work we funded last year that is now underway in Australia. You'll find an update on it later in this report.

Our Physician Advisory Committee Chair, Dr. Michael Frumovitz, has an on-going clinical trial at MD Anderson that shows promise. The trial's goal is to explore the use of a surgical procedure, referred as HIPEC, for recurrent mucinous ovarian cancer. It's expected to conclude in October.

Between these two projects, and the proposals currently being considered for Rhonda's Award 2024, our confidence is high that we are moving research in the right direction.

Improving Access to Information

We hear almost weekly what a difference our Resource Library is making in the lives of women battling this disease.





From providing connections to second opinions to disease-specific information, we have worked hard to assemble resources we couldn't find *anywhere* when Rhonda was diagnosed in late 2019:

- List of GYN oncologists who have experience treating this rare type of ovarian cancer? We developed one and continue to expand it based on recommendations from physicians and patients.
- Avenue for obtaining an online second opinion from a leading GYN oncology team? Thanks to the team at University of Chicago Medicine, that's a big YES now, too.
- Digital resource library with articles, videos, and podcasts specific to this disease? *You bet. One we'll continue to grow after our new website launches.*
- The attention of scientists at leading research institutions around the world? Yes! It's happening and some applied for Rhonda's Award 2024.

Goals for the Next Year

At MOCC, we use *hope* as a verb, not a noun. One that represents hard work, as well as promise. As we set our goals for the upcoming year, they include projects that will require both:

- Revamp the MOCC website and move it to a Google-friendly platform where it will be easier for women, families, and the health care community to find. This includes adding expert-written articles to our blog on a regular basis.
- Investigate funding opportunities that can help finance our new website.
- Expand our Physician Advisory Committee to add one or more members who have experience in mucinous ovarian cancer research or treatment.
- Explore new avenues for managing the *MOCC Cares* package process, including for obtaining donations.
- Continue to generate awareness of this disease in the funding community and among research institutions.

Thank you for joining us and making this fight your fight. With your continued support, we can make tomorrow better for women and their families.

AT THE YEAR ENDING JUNE, 2023

With help from each of you, our young nonprofit organization has accomplished much over the past year. Here's a quick look back at what we've achieved together.

JULY 2022

MOCC once again earns top rank from Great Nonprofits making us two for two since our launch in the fall of 2020!

AUGUST 2022

- The second annual *The Power of Hope* annual impact report for donors is published and distributed.
- MOCC and the Walk 4 Hope continue to be featured in the Bedford Press each month.

SEPTEMBER 2022

- MOCC is featured in several television stories, including a Cancer Moonshot story discussing President Biden's goals for this program.
- Or. Kylie Gorringe is announced as the first winner of *Rhonda's Award*, a research grant open to scientists worldwide who are working on mucinous ovarian cancer.
- MOCC celebrates our two-year anniversary on September 17th, the birthday of our late founder, Rhonda.

SEPTEMBER 2022

- The *Walk 4 Hope* is held in southeast Michigan. The event raises just over \$16,000 for research and projects for MOCC.
- MOCC hosts a month-long awareness campaign to coincide with Ovarian Cancer Awareness Month.



OCTOBER 2022

MOCC supporters, Kathy Mroz and Lori Baldwin, represent us at the Detroit Tigers "Teal the Bases" organized by Michigan Ovarian Cancer Alliance.



NOVEMBER 2022

We join other nonprofit organizations worldwide for the third time and participate in #GivingTuesday on November 29th.



MOCC offers *Caregiver Survival Kits* to family members caring for a woman with mucinous ovarian cancer in honor of National Family Caregiver Month.

DECEMBER 2022

- We kick off *Hugs for Havyn* to send cards and care packages to a 15-year-old young woman undergoing treatment for mucinous ovarian cancer.
- MOCC recognizes and thanks our all-volunteer crew in honor of International Volunteer Day.





JANUARY 2023

- MOCC is approved for the NCCN Patient Advocacy database.
- We initiate the search for a partner to build a new website for MOCC.

FEBRUARY 2023

MOCC begins to promote Rhonda's Award 2024 with call for proposals set to open in May.



MARCH 2023

The winner of the first *Rhonda's Award*, Dr. Kyle Gorringe, begins her research at the Sir Peter MacCallum Department of Oncology at the University of Melbourne in Melbourne, Australia.

APRIL 2023

- MOCC names Dawn DuPree and Alysha Eipperle as our Volunteers of the Year.
- Our volunteers host a Community Garage Sale that earns almost \$2,000 to help pay for the expenses associated with MOCC Cares packages.

MAY 2023

- Rhonda's Award 2024 opens with an invitation for researchers to submit an abstract for research projects up to \$50,000 by June 15th.
- MOCC is selected to be part of the Dana Open LPGA Charity Ticket program.
- MOCC continues our #ItsProbablyNothing campaign on May 8th, World Ovarian Cancer Day.







JUNE 2023

- MOCC Physician Advisory Board reviews abstracts received for *Rhonda's Award 2024* and issues invitations for top contenders to tender a full proposal.
- The 2nd Annual MOCC Charity Golf Outing is held near Grand Rapids, Michigan. The event is chaired by MOCC Board Secretary, Bonnie DeLange, and earns just over \$18,000 for research and services.
- As the fiscal year closes, MOCC mourns the passing of our cofounders' (Rhonda and Shelley) father, Ronald. He was among the organization's most generous and dedicated supporters, and will be greatly missed.

THE HISTORY OF

The Rhonda's Award



In the midst of a busy, happy life, Rhonda went for a seemingly routine physical. One she was faithful about having each and every year, complete with blood work and all the recommended preventative screenings. Within just a few hours of completing her blood work, Rhonda received a call informing her that there was a serious problem.

One test led to another as potential causes were eliminated. When ovarian cancer was initially ruled out, Rhonda and her family breathed a sigh of relief. The disease had claimed her maternal grandmother's life. Within 48 hours, however, Rhonda would learn that was a mistake. She did, in fact, have ovarian cancer.

Rhonda was diagnosed with mucinous ovarian cancer, which typically affects women at a younger age than other forms of ovarian cancer. Despite doing every test her doctor recommended each year, the disease had gone undetected and was at an advanced stage.



After several biopsies and a failed surgical attempt, followed by a life-threatening infection, Rhonda's prognosis was grim. Her loved ones searched tirelessly to find ongoing research or a clinical trial that might offer hope. But few alternatives were available for treating this rare form of ovarian cancer. It was the desire to fund research that would lead to more treatment options—and, eventually, a cure for this disease—that gave rise to *Rhonda's Award*.

MEET THE RHONDA'S AWARD 2023 WINNER

Dr. Kylie Gorringe, Associate Professor and Group Leader of the Gorringe Lab at the Sir Peter MacCallum Cancer Centre at the University of Melbourne, was chosen as the first recipient of *Rhonda's Award* in the fall of 2022. Her proposal, *Targeting the Mucinous Ovarian Cancer Environment, was one of several strong contenders for the honor.*

In providing MOCC with a status update, Dr. Gorringe explains:

"We would like to make a small protein ("peptide") that sticks to our target. To do this, we use a method that makes millions of peptides, and then we see how well they stick to the target. The ones that don't stick get washed away. The sticky peptides each have a unique tag made of a molecule called RNA.

We read off all the tags on the sticky peptides by RNA sequencing so we know which ones stuck and which were washed away. At the moment, this is the stage we are at – we have all the sticky peptides' tags and are doing the sequencing. We should soon know if we have some peptides that stuck well to the target!



If we do get some good ones, we can re-test them to see which stuck the most strongly and whether we can refine them to be even stickier. Then we can add a radioactive molecule to the peptide and test to see if it will stick to cells that have the target on their surface."
